## **Byelaw Review Update**

#### Meeting of the Byelaw & Permitting Sub-Committee

### (12th April 2018)

A packed agenda included decision making in regard to permit condition amendments for both the Mobile Fishing Permit Byelaw and also the Potting Permit Byelaw. Although permit condition changes relevant to the Live Wrasse Fishery are included within the Potting Permit Byelaw permit conditions, they were discussed as a separate item as required via the formal review of this fishery. Two items from the last agenda were <u>deferred</u> until the next meeting.

#### (16<sup>th</sup> August)

Eight members were required to attend the meeting for it to be quorate. Due to holidays and other commitments this was not possible and the meeting had to be cancelled. It is suggested that members discuss a suitable date or dates for the next meeting to replace the August meeting. The next scheduled meeting of the Byelaw and Permitting Sub-Committee has already been set for 15<sup>th</sup> November 2018.

#### **Progress - New Permit Conditions:**

Consultation was required to amend existing permit conditions for separate permit byelaws. (Potting and Mobile Fishing). The process (including legal advice and re-drafting) has resulted in new permit conditions being finalised and creation or changes to other supporting documentation such as policy, guidance and the application forms.

During August a significant amount of time has been spent re-circulating the new permit conditions and other supplementary information to existing permit holders. The re-issue of Potting Permits (over 500 Permits) required approximately three days of work from two separate officers.

Some (but not all) of the changes include:

- The introduction of IVMS (Applies to Mobile Fishing)
- An increase in the minimum size of whelk (Applies to both Mobile Fishing & Potting)
- A new narrower slot size for corkwing wrasse and a change in the closed season for the Live Wrasse Pot Fishery (Applies to Potting)

#### Reporting

All proposed changes in permit conditions are subjected to consultation. These proposed changes are set out in consultation reports that are posted on the D&S IFCA website and can be sent directly to stakeholders. The findings of all consultations are documented in the form of supplements that are provided to members prior to meetings. The separate supplements and the outcome of decision making are then merged into overarching Byelaw Development Reports which document the complete process in relation to each of the separate permit condition review. Final Byelaw Development Reports relating to the changes and the complete decision-making process from start to finish have now been created and are published on our website.
