Have Your Say

The Review of the Mobile Fishing Permit Byelaw & the Diving Permit Byelaw

What's the purpose of this information gathering exercise?

D&S IFCA is in the process of reviewing the Mobile Fishing Permit Byelaw and is about to begin reviewing the Diving Permit Byelaw. The Byelaws must be reviewed after five years and the reviews and drafting work will extend into 2021. The reviews of each Byelaw provide an opportunity for the associated permit conditions to be examined. Giving you the opportunity to have your say is part of these review processes.

D&S IFCA is inviting you to have your say on the existing scallop closed season that applies in July, August and September each year. The closure is a permit condition that is relevant to commercial fishers that have a Category One Mobile Fishing Permit or commercial fishers that have a Category One Diving Permit.

D&S IFCA is directly contacting everyone on our mailing list and all stakeholders can respond even if they don't conduct fishing activity relevant to the scallop closed season. This document explains how you and others can participate in the process. Your view is important, and D&S IFCA encourage you to forward this information if you know others that may have an interest.

This information gathering exercise is based around some topics and questions that are set out after some background information; however, you are free to express your thoughts and expand your response beyond the questions.

Background Information – What is the scallop closed season and why it is in place?

D&S IFCA must manage the exploitation of sea fisheries resources within its District. This is specified within the Marine & Coastal Access Act 2009. The scallop closed season originated in a legacy byelaw (2002) inherited from Devon Sea Fisheries Committee. Quota management measures which were introduced prior to April 2002 caused an increase in the fishing effort upon the scallop grounds. This led to scallops being fished all year round instead of just seasonally. Due to the increased effort, CEFAS scientists suggested that a closure period during the breeding season would be beneficial for scallop stocks. A closed season byelaw was introduced that prohibited any person removing scallops during July, August and September each year from a defined area on the south coast of Devon.

 The scallop closed season is not a restriction that has been implemented to protect features on the seabed from fishing activity.

When the Mobile Fishing Permit Byelaw was introduced in 2014 the scallop closed season restriction was incorporated into the Mobile Fishing Category One Permit Conditions; however, the area of the closure was expanded to the whole of the District. When the Diving Permit Byelaw was introduced in 2015, the same restriction was applied within the Category One Diving Permits. The closed season does not apply to recreational divers as these fishers have a daily catch limit that applies every day of the year.

- j) What are the benefits or disadvantages of your suggestions for yourself or others?

k) If you have more to say regarding the scallop closed season, please tell us.

How will your information help us?

We will collate the information you provide, and this may help our Byelaw and Permitting Sub-Committee in their decision making. During 2020 and 2021, work will continue re-drafting the Mobile Fishing Permit Byelaw, the Diving Permit Byelaw and the associated permit conditions. There will be further consultation in 2021 when each Byelaw is re-made. When the revised Mobile Fishing Permit Byelaw and the revised Diving Permit Byelaw are at an advanced state they will be subjected to a formal period of consultation and stakeholders will have the opportunity to support or object to them.
